

"Right to Work" Hearing Dodged

Good Bills Do Exist

Members of the Labor and Public Employees Committee, in an effort to establish collegial, bipartisan working relationships, considered holding public hearings on a number of controversial bills and subject matters. The willingness to hold public hearings was not intended to be an indication of support for any of those issues, but rather was to allow for respectful dialogue. The Connecticut AFL-CIO, our affiliates and our allies responded to the potential of a public hearing on socalled "Right to Work" . legislation by contacting legislative chamber leaders on

both sides of the aisle and all the leaders of the Labor and Public Employees Committee. Together, we worked successfully Thursday to prevent a public hearing on this anti-worker, anti-family legislation that enriches corporate special interests at the expense of

Though we were able to stop this initial threat, union members should not be complacent or rest easy. Hundreds of bills have been introduced to attack working men and women since the legislative session convened. We must all be vigilant and committed to defeating these and similar measures by educating our colleagues, speaking out and keeping in close touch our elected legislators until the session adjourns at midnight on June 7th.

In addition to the hundreds of bills filed to date that attack workers in one way or another (undermining pensions, slashing prevailing wage, gutting unions, curtailing collective bargaining, expanding corporate tax breaks, etc.) numerous bills have also been introduced to provide worker protections and force corpopayers. Among them are:

- SB 1 and HB 6212 by more than 30 legislators would create paid family and medical leave.
- SB 13 by Sen. Looney would phase-in a minimum wage increase to \$15/hour.
- HB 5585 by Rep. Aresimowicz and 45 Representatives would remove the Connecticut Technical High School System from the Department of Education and make it an independent agency.
- HB 5911 by Rep. James Albis would establish a legislative tax expenditure subcommittee to review and analyze the effectiveness of business tax expenditures and tax credits.
- HB 6101 by Rep. Josh Elliott would deny economic assistance and tax expenditures to any corporation whose CEO earns more than 100 times the average Connecticut worker.
- HB 6162 by Rep. Matt Lesser would create debt-free higher education for in-state students at public colleges and universities.
