What does Union membership mean to you? When I was 15 years old, I was lucky enough to get my very first job at Stop & Shop. I did not fully comprehend at first, how this job would entitle me to Union membership and its' benefits. It was not until some years later that I would grow to understand, respect and appreciate the protection and strength that Union membership and a work contract provided me and my co-workers. Most of us were hired into the Union, not realizing the hard-fought gains made by so many before us. I learned that the principles of the Union are dignity in work, fairness of treatment, reasonableness, integrity and honesty in all dealings, pride in work well done and a say in my working conditions.

Professional sports players and actors negotiate work contracts, wealthy CEO's and business leaders see value and protection by negotiating work contracts, so why should it be any less important to be protected by a work contract at my job? A Union contract is a legal binding document, negotiated in good faith to set a standard, to demand dignity and respect, to protect and defend those who choose membership. With Union membership, you benefit from strength in numbers, a Brotherhood and Sisterhood that only Union members understand, and many who are NOT members wish they could have. Union membership to me, means having a voice and at the same time, being a voice for the workers. It means having each other's back, as they say, "an injury to one is an injury to all." This is a concept that management can never enjoy. Union membership means being a good steward in our workplaces and in our communities, helping those in need, and holding our elected officials accountable to the promises they made to Labor. It means getting involved. It means assisting my local union to organize, diversify and grow. It means educating those new hires of their rights and protections afforded to them. It means being engaged with the membership, their concerns and ideas. As President Espinosa often says, "This is Your Union.....yours to protect.....and yours to be proud of".

What does Union membership mean to you? How will you choose to be more involved with your Union this year? Take that Union break, turn off the noise of social media for a few minutes to think of what Union membership means to you. Be safe, look out for one another, always stick together.

UFCW MEMBERSHIP HAS ITS BENEFITS

Since legalizing medical marijuana in 2012, Connecticut has seen substantial economic and workforce development as it relates to this growing industry. In less than a decade the state has seen four cultivation sites and over a dozen dispensaries opened to serve medical marijuana patients. This year, a recreational use bill will be introduced, which has the potential to bring even more economic prosperity to the state.

 An LPA ensures that workers have the choice and a fair chance at forming a union free from employer intimidation and scare tactics. Labor Peace Agreements level the playing field.

Since 2010, the United Food and Commercial Workers (UFCW) has helped to pioneer the development and stabilization of the cannabis sector. Currently, tens of thousands of cannabis workers across the United States are represented by the UFCW.

 The UFCW represents cannabis workers from seed to sale—which includes growing and cultivating facilities, manufacturing and processing facilities, as well as laboratories and dispensaries.

What's the union difference?

Union UFCW cannabis workers earn 13% more than nonunion workers. A competitive salary is not the only benefit to union membership. UFCW members can earn a completely free bachelor's degree for themselves and their immediate family members. The UFCW is also a national leader on workplace safety. Unions ensure that workers have dignity and respect in the workplace.

Here in Connecticut, UFCW Locals 371 and 919 are working together to ensure that cannabis workers have a voice on the job and employment benefits to support Connecticut families.

Connecticut needs not only jobs, but good paying jobs with benefits. Wherever cannabis is legalized, the UFCW is committed to building a successful industry with a thriving, diverse, and skilled workforce.
